We are so grateful to write this report again to all of you for another quarter in which we have always been very busy with the work. But hard work can not take away our joy and hope as we encounter many situations, good and bad.

Sitting in front of my computer typing, I'm looking back on the 3 months just passed and thinking of what the Lord has been showing through each story in our daily activities.

I'm reflecting to what our InnerCHANGE leader Mr. Mark Smith said: We are all God's agents to bring hope and blessing to the poor of all our target groups, no matter what job we are doing here in Sunrise—finance, guarding, teaching... we are called to be His body. We are sitting with the poor under the heat of the sun while the others are sitting in comfortable places to refresh themselves. It's not by accident but God's will.

Yes, we are all a bit disappointed when we heard that one of our donors will quit supporting Sunrise by the end of this year 2016 (they changed their focus). But thinking of the sentence "We are God's agents to bring hope and blessings to the poor" how could we stay disappointed like that? God gives us hope as he uses us to bring hope to others.

So we have to see the blessings more than sadness!

All of the stories below are not authored to make a pretty report, but they are just coming out from the heart and pure feeling of the clients. Education children:

From a little shelter nearby a small curved path comes the sounds of someone hand-making cigarettes. This is how one of our home based care client's children makes a profit and earns her living by working

after school. With a shining smile, she bravely speaks:

Hello! My name is Kong Srey Nith. I'm 13 years old, living in Tonle Bet village, Tonle Bet commune with my family. I have a brother and a sister. I'm studying in grade 4th of Tonle Bet primary school this year. My grandmother and my father are both Sunrise's home based care clients.

In the past, I had no good will towards my education because I didn't understand well in all my studies. I was also hopeless because of my family's poverty.

Before Mr. Chhun visited me and taught me, I had a very difficult time with my lessons and homework. I could not read or write well and had bad calculation too. My parents could not help me, even though they don't want me to be like them, as they are illiterate persons and migrants.

Now, I'm happy and enjoy my study. I can read, write, and do arithmetic better after Mr. Chhun taught me in the



home visit service. He also met with my school teacher to discuss my weaknesses in my study to give me help.

I would like to give thanks to the donors of Sunrise for providing us this service and for helping the children like me and others in the service.

A Home Based Care client:

Here is Ngoun Sothea a 62 year old woman, one of our home based care clients.

She's living in Au Sandann village, Beung Kok commune, Kampong Cham district.

In the last 10 years, her husband was frequently sick and had serious diarrhoea that did not get well through any treatment. Then after some years he died.

Four or five years after his death, Mrs. Sothea started getting sick. Her body became worse day by day. She got many medicines and injections but still no use. So one of her neighbours got her to take a blood test and found out she was HIV positive. Mrs. Sothea was in a very hard situation those years, because of her own health and living conditions. As a widow, she had no one else to help. Even all of her children had no abilities to help her. In addition, she had 2 grandchildren who are living with her because she wanted them to get education so as not to be like her. She was so worried about them that if she died, her 2 grand kids will be sent by their father (who had a new wife) to find jobs as a labourers working to help their family—they would have to leave school. Therefore, she has been trying hard to make a living to take care of them. She made her living by searching out some wild vegetables by the paths and in the village, picking them to sell at the market.

This year, her granddaughter is studying in grade 9th and her grandson is in grade 4th.

Some of the walls of their house were broken. When the rain is falling, it's blown in by the wind, wetting their clothes and other possessions.

Because of her hard situation, Sunrise has supported Mrs. Sothea's needs such as: repairing the house, food supplements, and a small business loan. Mrs. Sothea has a better living now. She can sell about 30000 riels to 35000 riels selling small goods in front of her house (\$8-9) for a profit of about \$2.50, in addition to her vegetable selling.

Deep from her grateful heart, Mrs. Sothea would like to thanks so much for Sunrise and its donors who caring the poor such her. She couldn't use words to describe her feelings, but just gave a blessing with both hands, putting them above her head in the Khmer traditional way!!



Prison Feeding Program story

Hello! My name is Ley Mousa. I'm 23 years old, and a male prisoner. I live in Trea commune, Kroch Chmar district.

I was a student before my arrest and I was sent to this prison on 26-Sep-2015 for a case of drug abuse. When I had been here about one month, my health became very bad. I had a headache daily, pain in my chest sometimes, and it was hard to breathe. All of these problems were getting worse day by day because of lacking nutritious food to eat and not having enough time out of the cell for exercises and sun.

My legs became numb, which made it difficult to get up and walk. I needed to hang onto the window slats if I wanted to stand.

With a sadness and fear, I really, really needed help! I am grateful and thankful for Sunrise that allowed me to join its medical clinic and feeding service for three or four months. Feeding us is a respectable deed that shows that you value me as a person—you gave me dignity. Now I'm getting well and the numbness stopped.

I don't know much about Jesus because I'm an Islam, but through hearing about Him from Sunrise I decided to participate in *God's Message* class with Heart Land's team right now. (Heart Land is a nearby church that is running classes explaining the Bible at the prison.)



Infant formula program:

Testimonies from Teang Saly's mother and grandmother

Teang Saly is a 4-month old baby girl and she is in our Infant Formula Distribution Service. Her mother, 24-year-old Vin Sanin, is living with her own mother, who is 64 years old (she is grandmother to Saly). That means there are 3 of them in their family, living together in their home in Treung Village, Prey Chhor district, Kampong Cham province. Here are their stories below:

I remember my past life....the time I was unhappily facing my poor situation. I left my home at the end of year 2014 to find a job in a factory at PP. Then, 4-5 months after, I was persuaded and cheated by a guy there. He said he loved me, but he already has his wife. After he knew that I was pregnant, he completely abandoned me.

At last, I decided to come back home to give birth to my baby. Unfortunately, when I met the Health Center's staff and had a blood test, I got a shock and was very disappointed because I realized that I'd become HIV positive. I got ARV drugs to prevent it spreading from me to my child. After I delivered my baby, I was guided to receive a service for getting formula for my baby from Sunrise which is very helpful to me. My family's situation is not well enough for me to go on as a widow, remaining enemployed & staying home to take care of my little baby.

So I tried to find a job in a factory again in Kampong Cham where I have been working to this present. I have no time to take care of my own child because of my job, so I left her with my mother at home where she is now doing well—more than me. I could only solve my problem by depending on Sunrise supporting me with my baby's formula milk. Without Sunrise, I couldn't.

In another voice from Teang Saly's grandmother:

"From my grateful heart, I would like to thank you, both Sunrise's staff and all of its donors, for providing this service for the poor. It's very helpful, as my daughter has already described. But a more important thing than this is I have heard more about Jesus through Mr. Heng Ban (the infant formula distributor) during meetings with him. He introduced me to Sunrise's identity and told about God. I used to hear about Jesus, because in my village there is a church there, but I can't read the church's name because I'm an illiterate person, so I don't know much about Him. Now, after Mr. Heng Ban has been



sharing Jesus to me, I have known Him more clearly and have faith in Him now.

One day, my other grandson, who is living nearby my house, played by the road, then suddenly ran, crossing the road in front of a big truck which was driving by. I was shouting with a fearful voice, but my grandson didn't get hurt much. He just peeled some skin a little bit while he fell down in the space between the truck's wheels. This was so amazing to me and my family. It caused us to have more faith in God.

In another story, one of my grand little kids had gotten lost one day and no one knew where he was. We were afraid that he might have met an accident or something bad happened to him. My family and my neighbors were sharing ways to find him for the whole day. Some villagers guided us to meet with a fortune-teller to make predictions and some told us we needed to offer food to the spirits or do something related to Cambodian's traditional faith, but we didn't do anything at all except trusting and praying to God.

Finally, we had found my little grand kid sleeping, hidden by some old clothes in a carriage under the house. We believed that there is God, truly with us!

I have six children, and my relatives all believe in God except some of my children who are working far away from home.

Orphanage Center Children: (This activity is supported by the Rustic team)

Hello! This is one of the orphanage's children's stories. Rustic has been supporting orphan tutoring fees this year through Sunrise.

With a tender voice and a bit shy, Miss Eang Him, a 19 year old girl and an 11th grade student of Sihanouk high school, slowly spoke:

I have been living in the Orphanage Center with my younger sister since we were so little, after our parents died. Sadly, we transferred from PP Orphanage Center to Kampong Cham Orphanage Center around 2004 and we lost all the background of our family's history. We had not been told about it.

My sister is 18 years old, but she is just studying in grade 5th, because she has problems with her thinking. She does not remember very well, and she has difficulty in her speech (her sound is not so clear) so she doesn't like talking much. She also easily bursts into anger with others. She does not have many friends in her daily life.

I used to have no hope for my education because I have no relatives to support me. I used to ask the professor to let me participate in his tutoring class, and he said ok—if the class has any vacant place, but it never does.



I would love to be a lawyer in my future's dream because I heard so many injustices in our social lives. I plan to finish my study by grade 12. If I fail my exam and could not get diploma II, then I will find vocational training through an NGOs to get food making skill because I will make my own business by selling food with my sister.

Now, after Sunrise has supported my tutoring fees, I have considered again and believe that I have a good chance. I will keep continuing my study until I have the ability to find a job as the others or to fulfill my dream one day.

Prayer Requests

Please pray for:

- Staff and clients' health & safety during hard periods of weather with rain. Half the time we are sweaty & miserable. The other half we are wet, maybe cold, and the roads are not safe.
- Ask God to bless us with more power, love, joy, peace, patience and wisdom in working together.
- Continue to pray for all of our staff to understand the new reporting format and how to measure outcomes properly.
- Pray for our staff. They are discouraged to hear Ratanak will stop funding its projects by the end of this year. We have applied to some new donors, but we still need to find more.
- Continue to pray for God to show us for the real needs in our society for next year's project (2017).
- Continue to pray for more opportunities to share about God. Pray also about cults who have stolen the sheep in many areas where we work.
- Pray for our leaders Susan, Mark and Sue for wisdom and good health to help Sunrise more.
- Pray for finding someone who will help Darany on grammar for English writing to leave Susan more time for finding new donors for Sunrise and to get the staff some training below.

Infant Formula Program

Women may understand that an HUV infection put their baby at risk of poor health or HIV transmission, and so they may try to protect their baby by spending an exorbitant portion of their budget on formula, or changing to rice milk, which is not sufficient to maintain proper growth or health.

Home-Based Care Program

Poverty of HIV families leads to lack of food, lack of information on how to care for their own health, and easy of acquiring other common illnesses. Their variable health situation, coupled with discrimination from society leads to a loss of hope and further loss of health, a vicious cycle that leads to being unable to take responsibility for improving their own situation.
