Fellow Rustics,

It's been 5 months since the last newsletter and there's been a <u>lot</u> of reunion activity, so I'll get started on bringing you up-to-date. REUNION DATES: 18-21 Sep 97.

It would be a shame if someone would have come, if only they had known we were getting together. Thanks to everyone who has helped 'dig' people out of the woodwork. There are still a number of others we need to find. If you can help us locate any of the remaining 'Missing Rustics,' your help would be greatly appreciated. The next roster update will be published in Sep and will be available at the reunion. [Note: due to mailing costs, roster and Rustic History Outline will only be mailed to Rustics. 'Friends' of Rustics may receive same upon request.]

**NEWSLETTERS:** Only 5 months till the reunion. To facilitate the flow of information, newsletters will be sent out frequently in the next few months. There will be a June and August update. Each will include a list of who plans to attend the reunion (so does this newsletter.) The June newsletter will also include *REUNION REGISTRATION* forms. They fixed a great lunch for the group. We looked through a few old photo albums, got acquainted (or reacquainted as the case may be) brought each other up-to-date on what's been happening in our lives, conducted some reunion business, and generally had a great afternoon visiting with one another. That night some of us went out together for a few margaritas, tacos and frijoles.

The second planning meeting was held here in Ft Walton Beach on Monday evening, 14 Apr. Ray Stratton Rustic/CC at Ubon) had come into town to do some business at Eglin AFB, so this was great opportunity to gather some of the local Rustics to meet him and discuss our reunion plans. 





HISTORY INPUTS: You don't have to be a accomplished author to submit a Rustic history input...just put it in your own words...and tell your story. We'd like to hear it. Here's a few stories that have been sent in:

#### BATTLE AT RUMLONG, Tues, 2 Nov 72-Doug Aitken, Rustic 16,

There was a troops-in-contact (TIC) at Rumlong. By this time they had been under constant attack for a week... I was in the front seat with one of the new French speaking pilots (Capt Bob Andrews) in the back seat. ... we flew down to Rumlong and ordered up some air to support the movements of the troops moving from the North and South towards Rumlong.

The Rumlong ground commander did not speak English or French well at all. As a consequence, we were forced to have him relay his information and requests for air strikes to the commander to the North. When we first arrived on station, Rumlong had asked for strikes very close to his position—virtually right on the perimeter of his position running North along Route 6, among the hootches either side of the highway.

He did not indicate he was in trouble and sounded calm on the radio. Blue Chip (7AF Headquarters) disallowed these grids, but did approve grids of known enemy locations (KELs) to the North and South of the town in support of the relief forces. All this information was being relayed at this time by 'Ramrod', an EC-121 used as a radio relay.

We planned to put the first set of air on KELs in support of the Southern Relief Column. Just as Hawk 05 showed up, the Northern ound commander called a TIC—receiving mortar, .51 cal, and small arms fire. Ramrod cleared me on those grids, and after the ground commander corrected my smoke, I cleared the fighters for their first pass.

Hawk 05 was a flight of two a-37's from our old buddies at the 9<sup>th</sup> SOS at Bien Hoa. (Here Doug explains their ordnance and the tactics they used to minimized taking ground fire 'hits' on their aircraft)

... on the TIC to the North, each had made two passes for me. Lead was out of rockets, and Two was out of napalm. Now it gets really interesting. Rumlong screams on the FM radio something which I cannot understand. He is in an honest to god panic. The Northern ground commander tells me that Rumlong is saying the VC are coming over the wire and infiltrating his position. I asked the fighters to hold high and got the grids Rumlong wanted hit. They were the same grids which Blue Chip had earlier denied me. They were 100 meters north and south of his perimeter, which was basically the marketplace at the only intersection in town. The Northern commander said we had broken his original TIC. At that point, our relief, Rustic 18, (Tom Clinch) was already on station orbiting the target area at 9000 Ft...I was at 5000 FT, and Hawk 05 was at 7000 FT. As I wanted to make sure that Rumlong really wanted a strike that close to his position, I put in a mark 150 meters north of the perimeter. The Northern commander relayed, "Good smoke, but go south 20 meters. He is really getting hit hard."

I declared a tactical emergency and had Rustic 18 relay same to Ramrod. I called the fighters to get into position, then while they were doing so, I rolled in and made three or four passes until my HE rocket pods were empty. I cleared the fighters in, having to restrict their run-ins to East to West or West to East due to friendly proximity. The hootches the bad guys were in were on either side of Route 6...on stilts, and the enemy fire was coming from under the hootches.

The A-37's did beautiful work, with Lead dropping the napalm, one can at a time, onto the road where it could splash under the hootches. When they were done, the Northern commander shouted, "Move 20 more meters South!" So the fighters used up all their strafe on that target, and then I made several passes with my 7.62. Hawk Lead reported that I was taking ground fire—the A-37's had also been hosed on their passes.

...out of ordnance and fuel, we left for home. Rustic 18 had requested more air when he passed along the information about the TAC emergency, and he was self expending as we left the area...just before we crossed fence, Rustic 18 reported that the NVA had broken contact at Rumlong...

I put the Hawk 05 pilots in for the Silver Star—They did great work in a bad situation, and got hosed on every pass. I have no ibt that without their accurate napalm and rockets, Rumlong would have fallen that afternoon.

#### A RARE DAY-TIME TRUCK KILL, 19 Dec 70 - Claude Newland, Rustic 19

Getting day-time sightings of enemy trucks in our Area of Operation (AO) in central Cambodia in 1970 were a rarity. Getting a day-time truck "kill' was even rarer. This was not too surprising since there just weren't many motor vehicles in the country to begin with, and secondly, what enemy motorized activity may have existed, usually occurred at night, was difficult to locate, and was almost impossible to kill due to the fleeting nature of the target. Central Cambodia definitely was not the Ho Chi Minh Trail., but on 19 December, 1970, I got lucky.

On the previous day, 18 Dec., I had flown aircraft # 639 on a five hour mission and put in 3 sets of F-100's on a routine target. This mission was somewhat unusual because I had a non-Rustic, C-121 ABCCC staff officer (name I don't remember) in my back seat. At the completion of this mission, I RTB'd to Korat AB, Thailand, to deliver this officer back to his ABCCC unit. RTB'ing to Korat for an overnighter was a rarity and was considered a special 'good deal.' Only recently had the Rustics been tasked to provide such shuttle services, and these missions were infrequent, so everyone was vying for the job. Also, being able to conduct such a mission without a French or Cambodian-speaking interpreter in the back seat was indicative that there were now a few english-speaking Cambodians attached to the various Cambodian ground units, so we could venture such a mission without the full benefit of an interpreter in the rear cockpit (It was doable, but having an interpreter in the RCP was still the most effective way to get good results.)

On 19 Dec, I was scheduled to fly a late afternoon return mission to Bien Hoa Air Base with a normal visual reconnaissance mission enroute over the AO. This mission was also a bit unique because I was flying solo— it was the only solo mission I ever flew as a Rustic.

The weather was beautiful. The monsoon season was over and the skies were exceptionally clear. The visibility was about the best I had ever seen. Unfortunately, there was no action all day in the AO, and being solo just made the mission seem that much longer I droned around for four hours boring holes in the sky. Approaching bingo fuel, I picked up an approximate heading of 130 degrees for Bien Hoa, climbed from 1500' AGL to 3500' AGL, and started home. As I crossed the Mekong River just south of Kampong Cham, the sun was sitting a little above the horizon and I began anticipating an uneventful flight back to base while enjoying a evening sunset.

As I approached the Michelin rubber plantation located southwest of Kampong Cham, a moving column of dust, arising from the plantation trees, caught my attention ahead of me and off to my left. I knew a dirt road ran ram-rod straight north-south through the plantation. Approaching the plantation from the southwest, I initially couldn't see the road due to my standoff angle—but someone sure was making fast tracks, heading south down that road, creating a terrible dust trail, and every second was bringing him closer to my intersecting flight path. The established Rules of Engagement defined this road as a Line of Communication (LOC) and any motorized traffic was considered hostile. I couldn't believe my good fortune, but I had to act quickly to get in position for a roll-in before I was spotted.

In quick succession I reached up to turn on the pipper, select the HE (high explosive) Rocket pod position, arm the Master switch, and start my roll-in. I was on a wider than normal left base position, so my dive angle would be shallower than desired, despite the fact that I was at 3500' altitude. This would require a little TLAR (that looks about right) methodology in my delivery.

I couldn't help but imagine the driver's surprise when he finally saw me. I was on a left base, rolling in from the southwest to the north with the low sun somewhat at my back. About half-way through my roll-in, he finally picked me up, slammed on his brakes, and started fishtailing down the road directly towards me in an even larger cloud of dust. With the thick trees on both sides of the road, there was no avenue of escape.

On an extended final, I raised my nose to correct for my shallow dive angle and fired off two separate HE rockets in rapid succession in an attempt to bracket the vehicle—which, for the first time, I could now make out to be a jeep. The first rocket exploded on the road short of the target and accomplished it's intended effect. The driver braked harder, skidding just off the west side of the dirt road, and came to a complete stop. Two persons immediately jumped from the vehicle and dove into the adjacent trees. Pulling up from my pass, I checked my gas—not good—I didn't have much playtime, and it was getting darker by the minute.

Turning left onto a downwind, I could see the jeep still sitting on the grassy shoulder of the road, but there was no movement. Assessing the situation, I armed my four 7.62mm guns for my next pass, thinking this would be the best means to disable the vehicle to ensure it didn't drive off after the sun went down. Simultaneously, I started calling Batcat ABCCC, hoping there was someone readily available to help finish off the job for me. (Time now being of the essence, under these circumstances, it sure would have been nice to have had a backseater aboard to help with this coordination.) Batcat said they would see what was available and I rolled in for my strafe pass.

Rolling in now from a more normal base position, I belatedly dialed in the correct mils for a strafe pass, put the pipper short of the target and opened fire, walking the pipper and bullets up to the truck, and then started a bunt maneuver to keep the stream of tracers on the target. Holding the pass a little longer than I should have, I started my dive recovery with a good pull. Once on downwind, I again observed no movement around the vehicle.

The question now —what next? I'm low on gas and the sun is rapidly setting. Fortunately, Batcat had the answer. They informed me Stinger 88, a gunship, was enroute, and was about 10 minutes out. Could I hold on a little longer to point out the target to them? I immediately went into a loiter mode with one eye on my gas gauge. Shadows were starting to turn a murky grey and dusk was setting in.

By the time Stinger 88 arrived, visibility was diminishing and I was having difficulty distinguishing the jeep's position in the darkening shadows. I briefed Stinger on the situation and as soon as he arrived, I immediately rolled in to mark the target by bracketing it with two Willy Pete (white phosphorous) marking rockets. As soon as I pulled off the target, I started a right turn direct to Bien Hoa

Air Base, giving corrections off my marking pass as I RTB'd. Stinger reported he too was having difficulty acquiring the target due to the approaching darkness, but said he had the target area identified and would go to work and do what he could. From the tone of his voice, I wasn't very confident that he would be able to find, much less hit, the target.

Approximately ten minutes later, however, Stinger called me to report that he had hit the truck and it was now on fire—one truck (albeit a small one) KBA. This was my only truck kill in my 9 months as a Rustic.

Somehow, the last vibrant colors of the waning sunset looked a little more beautiful to me that evening as I settled back for the remaining portion of my flight home.

#### THE LESSON -Clint Murphy, OIC Rustic Interpreters

I had been flying for only six or seven missions. I was trying desperately to juggle my responsibilities; taking notes, map reading, monitoring the radio in order to keep up with the mission's demands. I was still deeply impressed by the colors, shapes and sounds of the mission. Later, battle weariness and fatigue, coupled with the growing desperation of the battle would dull the edge of these first impressions.

On this day we had just begun our sweep over the area of o0perations when we received a desperate call for help from a FANK position in a small village. It was under siege and had been penetrated by the enemy. Despite a day long desperate battle to dislo9dge the enemy with a series of air strikes the FANK position was overwhelmed. The FANK commander went abruptly off the air and a dreadful stillness fell upon the battle. Nothing stirred below us. Not a bird or puff of wind interrupted the dreadful, placid face of the battlefield. Aside from the blackened patches that still smoked from the last napalm strikes. It was hard to tell that a desperate battle had taken place only minutes earlier.

We then flew north of town in order to contact another FANK position. After ten minutes we returned south towards the town, low and to the side of the road that ran through town. Just as we flew south of the town, I saw the body of a FANK soldier who had been thrown onto the road. He had been not been there before our small ten minute flight to the north. He lay there, half-naked in a fetal position. I observed him through my binoculars and saw that he had been shot in the back of the head. This suggested that he had been captured, executed and tossed on the road for our benefit. A deep shadow near his head was actually an enormous blood slick. I remember being astounded at how much a man could bleed. I took a picture of this man and we flew further south and then saw a sight at the crossroads that confirmed our impressions. It was a 'flower ring' of twelve FANK soldiers arranged head to head with their feet facing outward. Each of them had been shot in the back of the head. None of them had been there before our 20 minute flight to the north of the village. Someone was tapping us on the chest and saying, "What happened to these men will happen to you. You are next!"

This incident marked a great change in my attitude. After this time I began to see the enemy in a very personal light. A deep e and disgust for the enemy began to build in my soul. This incident was the first real communication between me and the enemy. The enemy had singled me out and personalized what I was doing. The envelope of distance and time, which I mistakenly thought had separated me and the enemy had ripped it apart.

What we had been doing was not a game or an abstract military exercise! It was nasty, brutal and very, very real. Now I understood why we were fighting these awful people. I knew in my gut that the enemy needed killing and lots of it.

### THE BIRDS—Clint Murphy, OIC Rustic Interpreters

On this mission I flew with Captain S., a madman fundamentalist from Alabama, a dead shot, tobacco chewing artist, and excellent pilot. I knew when I flew with him that things were going to pop. He would come up to me two or more days before a mission and have a "pre-flight" conference with me. "Murph," he would softly say, "got your shit together?" (chomp, chew).

"Yes" I would answer.

"OK" he would say. "Cause we are gonna kill, OK"

"OK" I would answer. And that was it. He was very, very, serious. He wanted to successfully nail the enemy and he wanted me to be mentally and professionally ready to do my part. I would then pour over my maps and intelligence information to have a "menu' of "hot" targets for him. We were going to be busy during the entire mission. We were going to definitely 'rock and roll" at the enemy's expense.

Things had gone well on this mission. That is, we put in two air strikes, strafed a few bicyclists and expended most of our 7.62 ammunition and rockets. We were on a roll and in a very rare instance of carefree behavior he announced,: "Gonna make a flower. Are you for it Murph?" (Chomp, chew).

"Sure," I said, thinking 'what is he talking about?"

'See those birds?" he asked. I looked over and saw on the edge of the great lake a tall tree loaded with hundreds of white herons.

"I see then," I said.

"Watch" he said, and winged the aircraft straight down at the tree. Down and down we plunged with the white ball of birds wing larger and larger. Then he fired a white phosphorous (Willy Pete) rocket in the center of mass of the tree. The tree of birds exploded into a beautiful expanding white flower. As we pulled up, Captain S. spat some red-man tobacco into a plastic bag and said: "SHIT HOT," and we flew on in the hunt for the enemy. Later, we expended the rest of our rockets and ammunition on some special targets I had prepared. He never mentioned a word about the white-bird flower he had created, and neither did I.

#### RECOLLECTIONS-Don Mercer's notes, Rustic 41

Sleepytime (Saigon Cap) Mission—By this time my vision as an air Force pilot was beginning to change. I was beginning to feel more like a transport pilot (God forbid) and felt the situation was rapidly deteriorating. During the previous two weeks I had gone back over to the 68<sup>th</sup> and 145<sup>th</sup> (Huey sqns) and grabbed a couple more rides as a door gunner. Firing the door dun from low altitude got the juices flowing. In hindsight I think I had seen one too many John Wayne movies. Today this only lends credence as to why most FAC's were lst lieutenants and Captains. We were expendable and in many cases did foolish things.

Somehow word got back to Maj. Hetherington and I had a great ass chewing as in "why do you think the Air Force put all its money into training you just to have you show no sense by flying in Huey Slicks." It was at this point that I was told I might remain a 2Lt for awhile as I was not "exhibiting any good sense." I vaguely remember expressing my frustration about the boredom and futility of the Sleepytime mission. One thing was for certain, there would be no more flights in the choppers but I still managed to get over to the 68th for a few parties. Guess I had been around too many people at VMI who thought like "grunts".

Rustic—28 October. Even though my message to the higher ups got no awards for tact and subtlety, it must have worked. After having received a couple hour intel briefing by Don Dorr on "Freedom Deal", free fire zones, the most highly trafficked routes, and many other items, some useful and some sundry, I was scheduled with Don Stone on VR2 or my first trip across the "fence". Got across but cut short due to weather.

I remember to this day that first night mission to Cambodia. As we left on the 313 radial out of Bien Hoa I was both excited and apprehensive. As we left Tay ninh and Nui Bah Dinh - "The Rock" - I felt like Columbus and that we had just reached the flat end of the earth. Talk about a dark void. The cark sky met the dark earth and there was no horizon other than the little gray and black ball Inm the cockpit. We were flying lights out as with virtually all night missions once we departed the Bien Hoa area and the cockpit lights were progressively dimmed in order to obtain improved night vision. The standard check as we crossed the border area was to go lights out. No need to create a target rich environment. The last thing that I want in this war was to provide the enemy with a marksmanship badge.

15 December—VR1 with Don Hagle. Put Hawk o3 (#4231) in at WU283322 and Hawk )5 (#4211) in at WU279317, both for Prey Totung. Got out in daytime. After having worked the area at night it was interesting to see it in the light. Enjoyed seeing the AO for a change. Saw an RF-4 making a recce run and a C-47 making an airdrop over Prey Totung. Both sets of fighters were handed off by an OV-10. Till can't believe that Prey Totung is holding out.

First set had slicks against a .51 cal site. Second set had nape and CBU against KEL (known enemy location). Both strafed as usual. Also worked Stinger 72 (#6915), then went up to Hotel 21. He said that he wanted to give Rustic 40 (Beagle) a VC head as a Christmas present due to the strike he'd put in the night before. Ran into incoming arty on the second stride. Nothing like wondering where the trajectories of that stuff is going.

Had a party when we got back. Bob Messer passed out this morning and just fell down where he was standing

#### THE MONSOON WATER SPOUT—Walt Friedhofen, Rustic R

Convoy CAP is usually a tedious, boring mission, and it was the luck of the draw that I drew such a mission with a fairly new Rustic in mid-1971 during the monsoon season. Water, water everywhere and nary a thing to shoot at. So, to liven things up, the pilot decided to put on an aerial display the likes of which would pit an base open house to shame. The Grand Finale was an inside loop so low I began to pray at the top. I can't say we actually pulled out - an atmospheric miracle must have kept us above the water. The convoy commander was ecstatic about the display and reported that everyone had come port side (about 15 boats) to watch. They were cheering wildly ESPECIALLY THE WATER SPOUT (his words) WE WERE KICKING UP AS WE PASSED THE COMMAND BOAT. I drank a 12-pack when we got home.

#### ASLEEP AT THE WHEEL-Walt Friedhofen, Rustic R

I had an early morning go with one of my favorite pilots who was obviously groggy from a hard night of partying and little sleep. Our mission was CAP for a huge water convoy stretched out over many miles of river. We had no contact with the convoy CC and even the two Black Ponies (marine OV-10's) wouldn't talk to us, so up and down the river we went. The pilot soon tired of this and gave me the stick. Up and down the river I went - for what seemed like an eternity. After a considerable time I realized that I hadn't heard a word from the pilot. I called to him on the intercom without response. I yelled, whistled, and rocked the wings. Still nothing. Then it dawned on me. He was out cold (or had died of boredom). At first it was amusing, then something else dawned on me. I had flown enough missions to know that we fueled out of the centerline first so it could be punched in an emergency, and I realized that it had to be very close to that time. I didn't know for sure whether the acft would transfer to the wing tanks on its own or not, but I wasn't going to wait until the engines started sputtering to find out. I began pulling Gs and negative Gs realizing all the while that I was using more fuel. It took forever (probably about 60 seconds) to bring him to life. When he awakened he asked what was going on. I replied "Oh, nothing sir - how's the fuel states?" His only comment was "Ah! Time to switch fuel tanks." WHUH!

RUSTIC HISTORY BOOK 'DRAFT': The 1st 'Draft' of the Rustic Unit History book has been printed and was distributed to each Rustic who attended the reunion (with a detailed cover letter of instructions written by Jim Reese attached.) Each Rustic is being asked to provided their comments, suggestions and critique of the 'draft' and, of course, we are still asking everyone to contribute a personal story, or two (or more), for the book. If you haven't yet submitted your input to Jim Reese, time to 'get on it.'---you don't want to be left out!! Your personal stories are what will make this book especially meaningful.

They say every good book is written five times (that means we are still just in the second, or third rewrite stages) so your careful, critical review of the book is very important to us. Your critique and inputs will ensure our book tells the complete Rustic story accurately and fully.

The draft book is already over 137 pages in length and would have been even longer if we had printed everything we plan to print—but, in an attempt to keep down initial draft printing costs, we printed just enough of the book to give everyone a good idea of what to expect. Once all reviews/inputs are received, the Book Steering Committee will do a final edit, insert maps, pictures, etc., and complete the book for final publishing—this could be a very lengthy and time consuming phase.

OUR OBJECTIVE: To make this the best possible book about the Rustic FACS!!! That means we're going to emphasize quality and we do not plan to rush ourselves with an arbitrary self-imposed publishing deadline. However, we do hope to have the book ready for printing sometime in '98. (Please help us with your timely reviews and get your story inputs to Jim Reese ASAP.)

OUR SINCERE THANKS to everyone who has already contributed to the book project—this book is going to be truly awesome work—it's the Rustics' Story that needs to be told!!

BOOK CLASSIFICATION ISSUE: We have learned that some you are still reluctant to write your personal Rustic story inputs cause you are concerned about subjects that you think might still be considered 'classified.'

Jim Reese and Greg Freix have thoroughly researched this subject and have verified that virtually everything pertaining to the SEA conflict that was classified from DoD sources is now declassified (all of our Rustic daily intell summaries and other classified Rustic documents were DoD sources). This information was confirmed by the AF Historical Agency.

This means all information pertaining to our operations in Cambodia and Vietnam is now unclassified. Anything you recall about specific missions, campaigns, tactics, weapons, U.S. or Cambodian personnel, geography, maps, targets, etc. are no longer classified. As long as we stick to information taken from DoD sources (we were all DoD sources while performing the Rustic Mission) we are on solid ground. It's when we get into information taken from non-DoD sources (such as CIA, State Department, etc.) that we may be on thin ice.

As a guide, whatever we can personally recall is almost certainly not classified. If there is any doubt, you should probably omit it from anything you submit.

RUSTIC FAC ASSOCIATION? During the reunion business meeting it was decided that the Rustics should investigate the feasibility of forming a Rustic FAC Association. Don Mercer volunteered to chair this working group. Our thanks to Don and the other volunteers, Wally Friedhofen, Shad Kimball, and Clint Murphy, who are going to assist Don. If any of you have information that might be helpful to this group, (on 'How to form an Association,' etc.) please get in touch with Don or any of the other members of this working group.

Go north 3 miles and turn right (east) at Indian Trail Dr. Go east for 1 mile to 4033 Indian Trail Dr. (bay side.) Phone: (850) 654-2955.

## Special Mission: "We need 3 Single volunteers!"

It had been an event-filled week. Lanny Trapp (Rustic 07) and Cambodian backseater Sgt Khorn had been shot down and recovered on 26 September, 1971. There was a major offensive by the Viet-Cong on Tay Ninh, South Vietnamese Provincial Capitol, and 30 Miles of Highway 22 up to Krek, the beseiged Cambodian rubber town. It was also time for the end of month party for the Rustics at Bien Hoa, to say farewell to those at the end of their tour and welcome in the "newbies". So it was on September 29 that the party (awards, recognitions and celebration) played it's course, and I (Rustic 08) retired to my room to write a letter home and call it a nite.

It was quiet by now, and about mid-night, and there came a knock on the door. To my surprise, it was Major Clifford, our C.O., and he asked if I had a minute to talk. So, of course I did. I had only been in country about 90 days, but had never been visited, let one at this hour of the morning, by "any" of the senior officers. After all, I had been a lowly 2Lt until 23 days ago! Major Clifford explained he was looking for "3 volunteers" for a mission – and ..... "they had to be single". I explained that to my knowledge, he only had 3 single Rustics. He confirmed my suspicion! So I responded – "in that case I am a volunteer ....... what is the mission?" He couldn't say – but advised I needed to be at the flight line at 06:00. I was to bring with me whatever I thought I might need for

toiletries for a day or two, a list of radio frequencies and a maybe a change of underwear. All would be explained. He departed, I wrote my letter and got a bit of sleep.

At 06:00 the 3 single guys/ volunteers - Otto Walinski, Bob Berry and I, gathered as requested. There was a group of Marines - 10 in all, and some other people we had never seen before, as well as Major Clifford. We we issued AR-15's, and told we were going to be "inserted" with the Army to call in Air Strikes "as required" to halt the offensive to take Tay Ninh. We would be inserted at both Tay Ninh East and Tay Ninh West, as well as just north of Tay Ninh in a town called Katum. The Marines were assigned to us for protection, and would accompany and remain with us for "the duration". By the luck of the draw, Otto got Katum, Bob Berry got Tay Ninh East and I got West. We were escoted to our Hueys and departed immediately for our appointed areas.

In my group was a surprise. Along with the 3 enlisted Marines there was a bonus – a Lt/Col. (I dicovered during the next day that he was THE ranking Marine in Viet Nam, and wanted to get out of the office for a while!) As usual, there was no advance warning to the Ground Commander at Tay Ninh West that I was coming. We were simply dropped off at "a convenient site" on the base by the Huey driver. We created quite a curiosity as we wandered thru the base, and asked directions to HQ. Here was an Air Force Lieutenant (I believe the fatigues I had on were still showing 2 Lt), wandering thru an Army base, with 4 Marines, including a Lt/Col, all apparently reporting to "the Lt". No one knew what to do with us. I met the Base Commander, explained why we had been sent, and equested a complete radio set-up. He ordered one brought to the HQ compound – and we were in business 75 feet from the door to the C.O.

I soon learned why we had been sent ...... for real. It was obvious the Army personnel there knew nothing of Air Force ordinance, and to eliminate a 51 Cal. position, would gladly have us expend a Mk82, Laser guided bomb, CBU or Napalm – regardless of separation or orientation from friendlies! We formulated a plan whereby the C.O. would advise me of the "threat" and let me advise and explain ordinance options. It worked great! With our proximity to Bien Hoa, we had ample communication with, and support from Raps, Hawks, Rustics and others. But I was never able to establish contact with either Otto or Bob, which concerned me.

The first day was a bit awkward, but things started rolling smoothly on day 2. Communications were improving with our Army counterparts, and we seemed to be holding the VC advance. It was not without it's moments, however. There were several rocket attacks, and one in particular that hit within a city block. The Marines slept on the ground next to the jeep (attached to the radio cart). I got to sleep IN the jeep, on the front seats, and never could get the stick shift to stay out of my back! Serious kinks? Yes there were. It was quiet when there was no action to coordinate – since a jeep with 4 Marines and an AF Lt was like a cancer – no one, I mean No One, except HQ personnel ever ventured near us. They looked, they pointed, they talked among themselves, but they would not approach!

By the end of the second day, one of the Marines asked if he could go visit an old buddy of his that he knew was stationed at Tay Ninh. I let him go, with request that he be back in 3 hours. Shortly after he left the compound, there was a rocket attack on the base, and we all hit the dirt, because one hit close. The Marine returned – and it had not yet been an hour. He was quiet – but none of the 3 enlisted men had talked much for the past 2 days anyway. He just sat down, took out his knife and started sharpening it. I noticed about 2 hours later he was still sharpening it. Came to find out that his friend, had been killed by one of the 122mm rockets that had been fired into the base. He spent the next 2 days either sharpening his knife or Breaking down and reassembling his rifle, with his eyes closed!


By the end of the fourth day, the offensive had been blunted. The Army C.O. and I agreed they no longer really needed my service, so the Marines called for a ride home, and I talked my way onto a Huey that was heading "toward Long Binh" – close to Bien Hoa. It was dark when we approached the base. Rather than contact the tower, the pilot found an open area, with no lights, landed and let me hop out..... into the darkness. As the Huey departed, the landing light illuminated a sign on the edge of the concrete pad I was on. It said simply: "Danger – Mine Field!" He had dropped me in the no-man's land between the ARVN and the US sides of Bien Hoa.

The only way out was a worn path ....into the ARVN side. Mindful of the "rumors" of U.S. personnel being attacked for their weapons, I moved down the path with some trepidation . My choices were to brave the mine field – go right for the U.S. side of Bien Hoa (and hopefully survive to kill me a Huey pilot) or go thru the ARVN side. With no option therefore, I strolled calmly into the base and wandered toward what I thought might be the front gate – having never been on the ARVN side. I got lucky. The surprised look on the face of the U.S MP's that were sharing Guard duty at the entrance was almost worth the trip. They sprung for a jeep and took me to the U.S. side.

I arrived at the Rustic hootch about 10:00 PM. And only then learned that Otto had been "dropped" into Katum just as it was being overrun. He was put in a tank and evacuated for the next 3 days. Bob Berry had also found his way back earlier in the day. We all were tired and had stories to tell, but Major Clifford later topped any we had, when he confided that at least one, and possibly 2, of us had not been expected to return from the mission.
