

NEWS FLASH - CH 1 - NEXT RUSTIC REUNION TO BE IN FT WALTON BEACH, FL IN 2011. After receiving confirmation from **Claude Newland and Lendy Edwards** that they would be willing to host a Rustic reunion in Ft Walton Beach, FL in Oct 2011, the Rustic Board voted to approve this change of date and venue. The details and exact dates are yet to be announced, but will most likely be in late October 2011.

Why the change of location and year? You may recall that at the 2009 reunion, no one volunteered to host the next Rustic reunion, so by default, it was decided to hold the next reunion in conjunction with the All FAC reunion in 2012. Although the All FAC reunion was a viable alternative, the Board concluded that, now that someone has volunteered to host a "Rustic" reunion in FWB, they (and most Rustics) would much prefer our own reunion in Ft Walton Beach rather than hitchhike off someone else's reunion. KOMPONG CHAM CHARITIES AND ORPHANAGE (**Edwards**): Currently, the Rustics have the following funds earmarked for Cambodian charities:

\$ 1,085.00 designated for the "Kompong Cham orphanage."

\$ 1,601.68 designated for "Cambodian Charity."

The Rustic Board has approved sending these funds to our local contacts in Kompong Cham who are affiliated with Sunrise Ministries. This is the same organization we have used in the past, although it was known to us as the "House of Hope" in 2000. Darany Hang, coordinator of Sunrise Ministries in Kompong Cham, will see that the orphanage funds are used to purchase specific items that have already been identified as "needed" by the children (clothes, shoes, supplies and bicycles.) They will deliver the items to the orphanage and provide a full report of the orphanage expenditures, as well as a report on how the "Cambodian Charity" funds were utilized by Sunrise Ministries.

Thanks to all for your generous contributions. Remember, your contributions are tax deductable.

Tom Capps and his grandson were in Cambodia in January and made a visit to Kompong Cham. Here's his report:

My grandson and I visited Darany Hang at Sunrise Ministry in Kompong Cham unexpectedly today. We had a

good visit catching up on what has transpired since I was there in November 2007. She says that she is getting adequate funding for the HIV/AIDS hospice they operate, but that she is aware of funding needs at the orphanage.

We stopped by the orphanage before going to Sunrise because the ministry has moved, and the phone numbers I had in my address book did not work. We found out that there is a new headmaster at the orphanage. He was the deputy until about two years ago. The new headmaster is much younger than the previous one, and he seemed to be well equipped to do his job.

The orphanage looked very good. They currently have 91 children and 15 house-mothers.

Darany told us that there are thirteen of the 91 children in the orphanage who attend private school. In order to continue with their education, they need \$115 each for the current year. That's a total of \$1,500. Beyond that, she said that the orphanage needs fifteen used bicycles @ \$35 (\$525 total). The last item she mentioned was money for clothes and shoes. She estimated that \$1,000 would buy clothes for all 91 children and shoes for those who need them.

Samantha Baker-Evens has replaced Danny Colombara in Phnom Penh. Her husband, Chris, works with CSI in Phnom Penh, and he is an acquaintance of my Cambodian friend who I work with. I will call Samantha and tell her about my visit today. Her phone number is 011-855-1774-7384, and her email address is saman-tha.bakerevens@gmail.com. My Cambodian friend knows Darany from Phnom Penh in the early 1980s. He was a young boy, and she was a young wife and mother. She has six children ages 13 to 28.

BTW, we drove down Highway 7 from Kompong Thom to Kompong Cham. My Cambodian friend did not know it had been paved recently. The last time I saw it in 1971, it was full of alternating cuts to control traffic. Also, all the old rubber trees in the country have been cut down and are being replaced with new ones. The trees we saw today were only twenty feet high. **Thomas E. (Tom) Capps**


5/2/10 Tom Adds: BTW, Darany and Sareth Duong, the young man I know who works with the Cambodian military, have known each other for about thirty years. She was a young wife who lived near Sareth in Phnom Penh after he was freed from a Khmer Rouge labor camp. Sareth will be visiting the US in late June and early July. I will be taking him to rice farms in Texas, Louisiana and possibly Arkansas to see how these farms are operated and to learn about their best business practices. Cambodians don't do a very good job of preparing their fields for rice paddies. Claude and I agreed that I should provide an email report to all Rustics at various points as we progress with the rice business development. I will likely return to Cambodia in October [2010] to help oversee the start-up of the business and then will return every six to twelve months. BLACK BOOK REVISION PROJECT UPDATE (Newland): All of the chapter texts have been revised and are currently being proofed and edited. A completely new chapter has been added entitled, "Birth of the Rustics" – which covers just the first week of Rustic operations. This is mostly all new information thanks to Roger Dodd, Dave Van Dyke, Mac McGarvey and Dick Rinehart. A lot of new Rustic history has been added to the other chapters that was not in the original book. 67 new stories have been added, plus a lot of new photos. This book is going to water your eyes. It is now estimated to be close to 525 pages. Completion date is still unknown, but we hope to have it ready by the end of the year. Hardbound and paperback copies will be available.

NEW FOUND RUSTIC--BOB CROTHERS (Roger Hamann): Thanks to the AFTWS site, **Bob Crothers** has been found. He was one of the guys who strapped us in at both Bien Hoa and Ubon. Bob's been told about the Rustic site and I plan further updates with him about everything Rustic. From his response, looks like we might have just found quite a few more Rustic support guys. Bob writes: I was stationed at Bien Hoa first, and

worked both Rustic and Rash control aircraft. Myself, George Harris, Bill Ready, Billy Frederick (Billy passed in 2005 from Alzheimer's), Jimmy Crain, and many others were on our second tour, as most of us were working C-130's out of the Philippines into Cam Rahn Bay (great duty) for our first assignment from tech school.

1971-1972 was one of my best tour of duty in the Air Force. So much so I am in the process of writing a book about my time with pictures from the 23rd and 19th. However, the book is mostly of a girl I left behind for this tour, but I still talk about the parties we had at Bien Hoa, and Ubon.

When I saw the picture of Doug Norman, I recalled the face and not the name. He was one of the backseaters that had a great personality and always joked with me as I strapped him in on the right side. I also can remember the party suits you guys had. If memory is right, you had black jump suits. I was one of the crew chief that some of you guys would ask me to make an ammo belt for out of the bullets from the gun pods. I would take the left over ammo from your return, remove the bullet and primer and empty out the powder and place the bullet back in and clip them together to the size you needed. We even had some of them chrome plated, except the bullet. I sent one home, and how it got home I have no idea. I did the same from the empty cases from the gunships and had the Thai's make wood bullet heads for them. They actually looked great in a clip all chrome.

In December of 1971 we all had great seats for the Bob Hope show in Ubon, which was one of the first shows done at night for him, and he joked about the FACs in his stage act that evening. I have the Bob Hope shows on video.

Norm took lots of pictures from the back seat and I was one of the lucky ones to get copies. Of course, I have those of Ubon as well. It amazes me how much they mean to me and how it brings back my memory of what I was doing when the picture was taken.

Roger [Hamann], your name does not ring a bell in my head, but I too am from New England (Mass). I know that most of us from the region were not close but knew of each other. And I may have even strapped you in, I was on all the early morning launches in Ubon.

During one of my trips to Saigon, to take a General up for a view of the war, I was in the backseat to Saigon, and we were crossing the gate and I heard on the radio someone speaking French and I told the pilot what they

were saying. He asked me how I knew that and I told him I studied French from the 4th grade through the 12th. It was required of us. Most of the kids that were Catholic studied Latin, I was not Catholic, so I learn French in school. Latin was too difficult. When we got back he told the commander and I was called into his office and asked if I would wanted to be an observer, to which I said no. I loved working on the planes, and my tour was almost over. The next month I contacted Hepatitis and was in the hospital for 30 days, then sent home on my normal rotation in May of 1972.

I suppose I have rambled on enough. Thanks for dropping in. It was great to hook up with another Rustic member. I hope to run into a few more. Drop by anytime. **Bob Crothers**

Group of papers circa 1975 concerning possible reunion with "Sam the FAC"

AF OUTSTANDING UNIT AWARD (AFOUA). Roger Hamann, Rustic Yankee, discovered that the posting of **Joe Gambino's** profile page on the AFTWS website indicates Joe's "unit" received the AFOUA with "V" during his service period (26 Aug 1971 - 28 Jan 1973.) Roger checked his revised DD 214, which was updated after he was awarded a DFC, and he didn't see any record of the AFOUA w/ "V" device listed. Roger asks, "Does anyone else have info on this?"

In reply, **Bill Ernst**, Rustic 04, initiated a formal inquiry to see if the "V" devise was ever awarded. Here's what he found out after contacting the 15th Wing - Awards & Decorations office at Hickam AFB. The 23 TASS was awarded a Presidential Unit Citation for the period "01 April 72 to 22 Feb. 73" on Special Order GB 046 in 1977. Those who served in the unit during that period have either been awarded the PUC or you may ask that your Personal Record be corrected.

You can obtain a copy of your Personnel Record by submitting an "Application for Correction of Military Records" DD Form 149, Sept. 2007. This is sent to the "Air Force Board for Correction of Military Records (AFBCMR).

- (a) Attach a copy of your DD Form 214.
- (b) You can request a corrected DD Form 214.

The Air Force Outstanding Unit Award with the "V" for Valor was <u>not</u> in the records for the 23 TASS. We looked for the 505th Tactical Control Group and could not find out which units belonged to the organiza-

tion. The Special Order GB 0046 was listed and dated in 1977 but it could not be found. The 23 TASS would have to have been in this Group during the specified time in order to be eligible for the ("V") award. This will take more research to determine the answer.

Bill says he will contact someone familiar with the 505th Tactical Control Group and determine what units were in the Group. The Lineage states that it was activated on 2 Nov. 1965 and inactivated on 15 March 1973. Standby for news!

NEXT ALL FAC REUNION Fort Worth, TX. Wed. 27 October - Sun., 31 October 2010. The timing was made to coincide with the Fort Worth Alliance Air Show which 30 & 31 October and includes the Blue Angels. 

DD FORM 214 -- SOCIAL SECURITY BENEFIT. If you were on active duty between January 1957 - December 31, 2001, this could be important to you if you are planning for retirement. In a nutshell it boils down to this: Veterans qualify for a higher social security payment because of their Military service for active duty from 1957 through 2001 (the program was done away with 1 January 2002). Up to \$1200 per year of earnings credit credited at time of application - which can make a substantial difference in social security monthly payments upon your retirement. You must bring your DD-214 to the Social Security Office and you must ask for this benefit to receive it. This benefit is not automatic, you must ask for it! From: Tif Rock

My name is Tif Rock and my older brother 1st Lt **Michael Vrablick** [O-2 pilot] served in Cambodia in 1970, one of the two [Rustic] pilots that were killed near Kampong Cham on October 1st. His time there was extremely short (only 46 days in country); having been assigned no nickname, and flown only as support before his death. I knew no details of his death, including where he died for years, and when I chanced upon your book accidentally in 2004 it was an amazing journey to read so much of the individuals that shared the final weeks of his life.

I have lived with never ending internal turmoil that he was far from home, alone and had no idea what his final moments or hours were like. To learn in your book that he was treated with respect and compassion in death was an amazing comfort and has quieted some of that turmoil. Having this information finally gave me the

courage to visit The Wall and face the reality of his name engraved there, to grieve, to laugh, to remember and to finally begin to heal.

I also accepted and cherished the medals that I had denied, which unfortunately were all stolen when my house was burglarized. Once again I was aware of the amazing kindness and compassion of strangers as Sheriff Deputies and neighbors spent personal hours contacting pawnshops and searching online auctions for any trace of these treasured items. None of the awarded medals, his Eagle Scout award or other items that attached him to my life have ever been found.

I am now considering a trip to Cambodia, to see the country and to pay my personal respects to a land and a people that transitioned his soul so lovingly. I am in the process of researching and building my courage for the journey. I am not sure if you ever met Michael or were in Cambodia at the same time he was there, but if not I am hoping that you can direct me to someone who might have been. I would like to locate the place where his plane went down, where he was honored and be where my big brother and best friend departed from my life. Hoping you can help.

Whatever your response to this request, know that I am eternally grateful to you for the time and effort you took to chronicle the events of my brother's unit in Cambodia. You will never know the internal peace that you brought into my life. I am sorry that Michael did not serve longer with the Rustics, had they gotten to know him, I know he would have been liked and I will always wonder what nickname he would have been given. Thank you!



- **AF OUTSTANDING UNIT AWARD (AFOUA) WITH "V" DEVICE.** Some months ago, one of our members noted that the website that listed SEA KIAs showed that Rustic **Joe Gambino** had received the AFOUA with "V", and the Presidential Unit Citation. Our member was wondering if all Ubon Rustics had similarly received these awards? Ubon Rustic **Bill Ernst** took up the search with the National Personnel Records Center and here's his report:

I have not found any reference to an award of the Air Force Outstanding Unit Award (AFOUA) (with or without the "V" for valor) for the 23 TASS. I suspect that the mention of an AFOUA with the "V" device in the news release concerning **Capt. Joseph Gambino's** death was done in error. That award was given to the 505 Tactical Control Group. I have not found any evidence that the 23 TASS was assigned to that group.

It might be helpful if you could request information from those Rustics who served in the 23 TASS in the late 1960s. They may have knowledge about any AFOUA that might have been awarded to a Group or Wing that the 23 TASS was assigned to. Usually the Squadrons are included when a higher unit like a Group or Wing receives the AFOUA or the Presidential Unit Citation. Can you place a request for data in the newsletter?

- **23 TASS PRESIDENTIAL UNIT CITATION. Bill Ernst.** The PUC was awarded in 1977 to those who served in the 23 TASS during the period 01 April 1972 to 22 Feb 1973. The Special Order number is GB-046/77.
- 1)To receive a copy of your AF records, go to www.archives.gov/research/order/standard-form-180.pdf and complete the form "Request Pertaining To Military Records." You can do that with a form 180. Block 14 shows where to send the request. It can be done electronically at: www.archives.gov/veterans. In about 30 days I received a reply from the "National Personnel Records Center" which consisted of about 30 pages.
- **2) DD Form 149.** Go to www.dtic.mil/whs/directives/infomgt/forms/eforms/dd0149.pdf (or Google "DD form 149") to receive a copy of the "Application for Correction of Military Record." Mail this form requesting the Presidential Unit Citation for your service in the 23 TASS.
- RUSTIC TOM CAPPS RETURNS TO CAMBODIA AND VIETNAM. Tom Capps departed Raleigh, NC on 5 November for Bangkok and will return from Saigon on 26 November. His trip will include visits to Bangkok, Cambodia and Vietnam. He will spend two weeks in Cambodia setting up the first phase of a for-profit

rice business using the Business As Mission (BAM) concept. The objective with BAM is to make to outreach to the Cambodian military self-supporting. Here's Tom's report on what this trip hopes to accomplish:

The first phase will involve the purchase of raw rice which we will have milled before bagging it for retail sale. It is likely that the point of sale will occur in Sisophon which is on Highway 5 about 47 miles east of Poipet which located on the western border of Cambodia. According to my host, Sareth, there are no retail sales outlets for rice in this city of approximately 30,000. The first phase of the business will also involve growing improved rice seed that we will obtain from the International Rice Research Institute (IRRI) in Manila, Philippines. According to a scientist Sareth and I met at the Louisiana State University Rice Research Station, providing improved rice seed to farmers is the best way to improve their rice production. From the small amount of seed we receive from the IRRI, we will grow multiple crops of rice each year for a couple of years in order to generate enough seed to distribute to farmers. At that point, we will begin phase two of the business which will involve distribution of improved rice seed and fertilizer to farmers in order to help them improve crop production. Throughout the process, we will be training the farmers how to manage all aspects of their business. Sareth's father who has nearly forty years experience as a farmer and with the Department of Agriculture will be managing the business for us. Profits from the business will be used to train chaplains to work with the Cambodian military, subsidizing feeding of needy military families and subsidizing the education of children from needy military families. Sareth recently built a school for 500 children in his community where no school existed.

Following my visit to Cambodia, I will take the bus from Phnom Penh to Saigon where I will me with Ngoc Huynh Man. Man works with Campus Crusade for Christ and is heavily involved with university students in the southern half of Vietnam. He has been able to rent three homes where 35 university students live inexpensively and safely. The large university in Saigon has 80,000 students but dorm space for only 5,000. I will be working with Man to plan construction of a 100-student dormitory that will be operated as Business As Mission. This concept involves a for-profit venture that will be used to support outreach to university students so that Man will not have to depend on contributions for his ministry.

Tom Capps is hand carrying a copy of the Rustic Book to present to the Sunrise Ministry Staff at Kompong Cha on behalf of the Rustics. An Inscription has been placed inside the front cover thanking the staff for the work they are doing on behalf of the Cambodian people and for their assistance to the Rustics.

KOMPONG CHAM CHARITES AND ORPHANAGE (Edwards): After careful consideration, the Rustic Board authorized all remaining Rustic Cambodian charity funds be sent to Sunrise Ministries in Kompong Cham in May 2010 to be used as follows:

\$ 1,085 - for the Kompong Cham orphanage. \$ 1,601.68 for Sunrise Ministries in Kompong Cham.

Here's the latest report (3 Jun 2010) from **Samantha Baker Evens** on the work being accomplished by Sunrise Ministries with our Cambodian charity funds:

Hi Claude and Lendy-

I spoke to **Darany** [KPC Sunrise Ministry Director] today about the tutoring [at the orphanage] and their plan is to have the 18 youth who need the tutoring to finish high school come to Sunrise to get the money for the tutor and then bring back a receipt- so the orphanage itself won't be involved directly. Then periodically, our administrator, a young man named Chyy, will go to observe the students at the tutoring and will ask questions of them and the tutor to make sure they are attending regularly. **Darany** feels this will be sufficient accountability and I agree. She also reiterated the importance of the tutoring as this is tutoring that most parents would provide for their children to make sure they passed the exam but that these kids don't have access to because they are in the orphanage. She also assured me that the younger children in the orphanage are attending school and have the uniforms and materials needed. I believe a portion of the Rustics money has already been used for the school materials for them.

The money for Sunrise will go to children affected by HIV/AIDS. We'll report more on both projects as they unfold.

He survived the ordeal, but his car needed a new windshield and required extensive hail damage repair. 

VETERANS MEMORIAL AIR PARK MAKING PROGRESS

FORT WORTH, TX – September 16, 2010. The Veterans Memorial Air Park of Fort Worth with its growing collection of warbirds (currently 18) and many aviation artifacts is expected to opened on a 50-acre site at Alliance Airport in North Fort Worth.

W.B. "Zim" Zimmerman, Fort Worth city councilman (District 3) and president of the Fort


Worth Air and Space Museum, said the City of Fort Worth has budgeted \$115 million for the development of a world-class aviation museum. The museum is expected to open in 2015. Zimmerman was on hand at the Veterans Memorial Air Park (VMAP) on Sunday, September 12, when the city's newest museum opened its doors. Back in the 1960s Zimmerman took the right seat alongside the legendary test pilot Neil Anderson, during test trials of the fighter/bomber the F-111. And a few years later he flew back seat during trials of the then-new F-16, with its revolutionary fly-by-wire controls. Zimmerman retired as Vice President of Product Support at Lockheed Martin Tactical Aircraft Systems of Fort Worth in 1999.

"...just to make sure the instruments were all up and running," Zimmerman explained to this newsletter writer.

Congresswoman Kay Granger helped secure two of the OV-10s -- one had seen duty with the California Department of Forestry and the other in Alaska and worked its final days with the Fairbanks Bureau of Land Management.. Both of these aircraft had seen action during the Vietnam War.

KHMER ROUGE BROGHT TO JUSTICE? In July a special UN–Cambodian criminal court sentenced the infamous Khmer Rouge Kaing Guek Eav, better known as Duch, to a 35-year prison term, with 19 years left to serve. Duch oversaw the torture and execution of at least 12,273 prisoners during the Pol Pot regime and was accused of war crimes and crimes against humanity.

But after spending much of the 77 days of court hearings expressing remorse, Duch is now appealing the sentence and asking to be released, claiming that he was neither one of the regime's leaders nor among those "most responsible" for the Khmer Rouge's atrocities, the only people the special court in Phnom Penh is entitled to try. This request reflects a dramatic last-minute shift in the defense's strategy, from cooperating with the court to disputing its authority to judge Duch. That Duch could undermine the trial and its outcome in this way highlights its central flaw: all along, he was allowed to dominate the telling, and so influence the judging, of his own crimes.
