We'd like to make this information available at the reunion or in future newsletters. If you cannot make the reunion, we will try to find a way to share this information with you. Start writing.

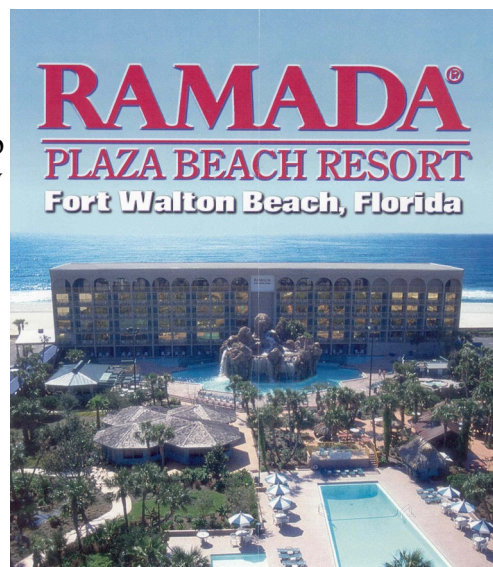

He has been invited to attend our upcoming reunion and we are awaiting a response. O-2 BEING RESTORED. From **Noland Hargrave**. FACS, we are restoring Cessna O-2, tail # 86877, as a static display at the Wings Over the Rockies Museum in Denver, CO. I am one of the volunteers in the Restorations dept. and a Vietnam veteran, 67-69. We are working hard to keep the plane as original as possible. It did fly in Vietnam and was stationed with the Illinois National Guard in the '70s. It sat outside in the sun in Arkansas for over 30 years and took quite a beating.

If you flew this aircraft or have any history on her, please contact me and give me a brief history of your flights, etc.

We are missing only 3 or 4 gauges from the instrument panel, the gun sight, and the armament switches to the right of the gunsight. We are trying to track them down. **We also need a photograph** of any equipment that was in the rear cockpit, if any. We're not sure what went back there.

If you or your members have any contacts for parts it would really help in this project. Do you know if you have any members familiar with the O-2 in the Denver area? We sure would like some O-2 "experts" to visit and give us advice or even help! BRONCOS STILL IN ACTION. From **Frank Sovich**, Rustic 36. Vice Admiral Mark Fox, U.S. Navy (retired), former Deputy Commander, U.S. Central Command reports:

The blinding flash of the two 2.75-inch Hydra rockets leaving their tubes in less than a second temporarily blinded the OV-10 Bronco aircrew in their dive toward their target. Minimizing their noise signature at high altitude, they had been quietly stalking the two small boats with four confirmed enemy combatants continuously for three hours. They were moments from beaching their canoe filled with weapons and equipment headed to the front lines. Until that moment, the enemy's resupply route across the river had been completely open, allowing a steady flow of well-trained fighters, weapons, and vital equipment to be transported by canoe and small boat.

Both rockets detonated less than a foot from the two insurgents with devastating effect. The Bronco crew immediately assessed their hits, scanned for surface-to-air threats, added power and performed a maximum G turn to set up for an attack on a second canoe in their formation 500 meters upriver from the first target. Alerted to the attack on their lead canoe, the second pair of insurgents jumped from their boat and quickly swam to shore in search of safety. They found none. After the second "cleared hot" from the Joint Terminal

Attack Controller (JTAC), the second salvo of rockets, fired only 90 seconds after the first attack, landed within two feet of the remaining enemy.

The engagement described above did not take place in 1960s or '70s Southeast Asia. These attacks were executed by naval aviators above the Tigris River in Northern Iraq in summer 2015, exactly 47 years to the day after the first OV-10 Bronco combat engagement in 1968. The contrast in similarities is astounding. In a nod to the heroic naval aviators who preceded them a generation before, the Broncos were painted in Vietnam-era Light Attack Squadron Four (VAL-4) "Black Pony" markings. The 2.75-inch rockets used during the attack were the same deployed in Vietnam, but now outfitted with the advanced precision kill weapon system (APKWS) laser-guidance kits. Even though the aircraft were equipped with the latest high-definition (HD) color forward-looking infrared (FLIR), HD large-screen color displays, helmet-mounted cueing systems, datalink and beyond-line-of-site communications and video, advanced threat warning systems, the latest infrared expendable decoys and night-vision devices, aircrew employed the same reconnaissance tactics, techniques, and procedures and light-attack mechanics perfected during Vietnam and Operation Desert Storm.

RUSTICS VISIT THE 74th FIGHTER SQUADRON FLYING TIGERS – A-10 Rustic FACs. Five Rustics (**Doug Aitken, Tom Capps, Lendy Edwards, Bob Harris, and Claude Newland**) rendezvoused at Moody AFB, Valdosta, GA on Thursday evening, 13 April. That night they enjoyed a dinner downtown with their 74th squadron host, **Capt. Charles "WAE" Cole**. The next day, they had an awesome visit to the 74 FS squadron, flew the A-10 simulator, observed an A-10 weapons loadout exercise, and toured the flight line. The highlight of the visit was briefing the 74th FS members on who we are and our Rustic mission in Southeast Asia. They are really into our Rustic history. **Doug Aiken** put together a great slide show and each of the attending Rustics had a speaking part in the presentation. Following the briefing, we presented the squadron two copies of our revised Rustic book for their archives and several Rustic challenge coins. The day concluded with a raucous time in the well-appointed and well-supplied squadron bar. It was like the good old days! Oh, and Bob's wife, "Charlie", was also in attendance. She added a lot of class to the affair just by being there. Bob and Charlie drove from Oklahoma to attend this event. As you know, Bob recently had some serious medical issues. We're happy to report he has rebounded nicely and is looking good.

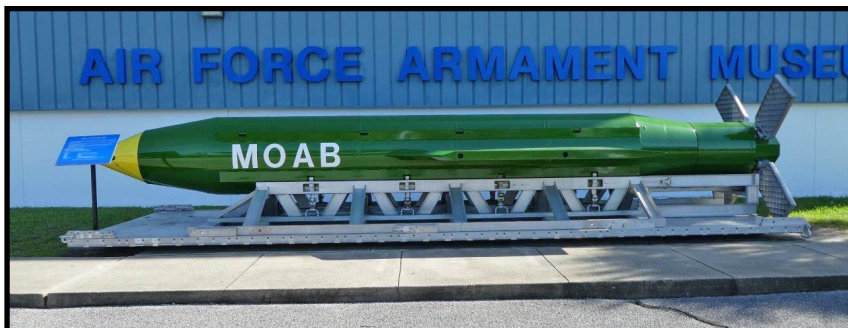

Since, he has spoken to thousands of members of corporate America, government agencies, and non-profit groups. Ed's desire to change the attitudes of individuals through a better understanding of true, human potential remains his number one goal in life.

Colonel Hubbard, is the author of "ESCAPE FROM THE BOX", a fast moving, hard-hitting, inspirational self-leadership book in which he shares the valuable lessons he learned during 2,420 days as a prisoner of war in North Vietnam. DON BROOK’S REMEMBERS GEORGE LARSON. During **George Larson’s** memorial service, a family friend read the following letter from **Don Brooks, Rustic 02:**

I know most of you have never heard of the Rustics or know what they were. They were a very special group created under the direction of President Nixon during the late phases of the conflict in Southeast Asia. At the time, their mission was absolutely Top Secret. President Nixon had decided to provide US Air Force support to the Cambodian government in their struggle against the Communist forces trying to take over their country. The Rustics were created to work with the Cambodians to control and direct this effort. The Rustic mission was to fly slow, lightly armed observation aircraft over the enemy forces and, in coordination with the Cambodian soldiers, bring air support as necessary to the friendly forces.

An obvious requirement for this to work was a means of communication with the Cambodians troops on the ground. Since none of the US pilots spoke Cambodian and very few Cambodians spoke English, a real problem existed. However, many of the educated Cambodians spoke French, so an immediate request for volunteers was generated throughout all of the US installations in Southeast Asia for anyone fluent in French. They weren't told what the job might entail, only that they were asked to volunteer for a special mission that was highly classified and could be quite dangerous.

George was one of the individuals that volunteered. Just imagine, if you will, an enlisted man in the US Air Force that had spent his entire time working in administrative jobs, shuffling paper, etc., then all of a sudden you find yourself strapped into the back seat of a small plane flying secret missions over enemy territory and getting shot at almost every day!

To add a personal touch to this account, I was one of the pilots flying the Rustic missions. I flew many combat missions with George. I quickly learned what a wonderful and talented individual he was. I was always delighted to have him ride in my back seat, serving as my interpreter with the besieged forces on the ground. George wasn't just an interpreter, he quickly became an essential addition to my job of locating the enemy on the ground; he was another set of eyes. Many times, he would spot things that I had missed, and would add immeasurably to our overall effectiveness. He was, without doubt, one of the best crewmembers I ever had the honor of flying with. George was a great example of the very best we had. I can never forget how much I appreciated working with him. I am happy to call him my friend.

I can't leave a story about George without telling about how he got his nickname within the Rustics. Our flights over Cambodia usually lasted about five hours. Most of us could endure those flights without too much hunger, but not George. He would always order a box lunch to take along with him. Consequently, he gained the nickname of "Lunchbox." As long as there is a Rustic alive, they will always remember Lunchbox Larson! Of course, I must admit, whenever there was a lull in the action, it was nice to hear a call, "Say, major, how would you like a half of a sandwich?"

George Larson was indeed a very special person and a friend to all of the Rustics. He will be missed.

Additionally, in conjunction with our latest reunion, the Rustics received donations of over \$800 for Cambodian Charity efforts which will go to Sunrise. One Rustic has committed a gift of \$2,000 as a challenge to fellow Rustics to contribute additional funds to help this amazing care organization.

The Rustics first became acquainted with the staff of Sunrise Ministries when **Don Mercer** made a solo trip to Cambodia. Following Don's trip, a group of Rustics made a return visit to Cambodia in 2000 and also met them. **Tom Capps** has visited Sunrise in 2005, 2007 and 2009 and has established a close tie with **Darany Hang**, Sunrise Director. The Rustics have continued a close working relationship with Sunrise and are confident our contributions are put to good use -- 94% of all contributions go directly toward helping the Cambodia people. Additional information about the work of Sunrise Ministries is available in reports posted on the Rustic website, www.rustic.org.

Here is Tom Capps' Perspective on the Ministry and Management of Sunrise. During my three visits to Sunrise, both before and after Darany Hang became director, I have been thoroughly impressed by **Darany Hang's** total commitment and capacity to care for HIV/AIDS patients and their families. She is the catalyst for all the good work to patients, children and prisoners in the local jail. As a result of Darany's strong leadership, Sunrise is known to the community to be the go-to place for important care. Anything that Rustics as a group or individual Rustics can do to support Sunrise Ministry will result in life-changing outreach to the most-needy Cambodian citizens. Of the HIV/AIDS patients in the local hospital, 90% die. In contrast, 90% of the HIV/AIDS patients under the care of Sunrise get to go home to their families. I encourage every Rustic to consider a recurring gift designated to Sunrise so that we can augment the annual \$2,000 gift from the Rustic organization.

MIKE THROWER -- PROUD OWNER OF AN SKS RIFLE. **Bill Ernst** (Rustic 04 and Nail 09). In July 2017 I decided to create a raffle for a SKS rifle that I received during my FAC tour. During the early part of 1973 a group of USAF and Royal Cambodian Air Force officers landed in a USAF C-47 at Ubon RTAFB. They created plans to use United States resources for locating the enemy and attack using U.S. aircraft.

The Rustic FACs were authorized to land and rearm at Phnom Penh Airport in March 1973. The second sortie then returned to and landed at Ubon. U.S. Navy and U.S. Air Force fighters were used to attack targets within Cambodia. The OL was stationed at Ubon RTAFB and was supporting the Cambodians with daily FAC flights, and using U.S. Navy and U.S. Air Force fighters.

On one of **Colonel L. Oum's** visits to Ubon RTAFB he brought many items captured from the enemy and gave them to the Rustics. I was given an SKS rifle. I think it's time to share some things with others. I decided to have a raffle and find a new owner for the SKS. The beginning of the raffle began with 23 Rustics asking to be considered. I selected **Mike Thrower**, Rustic 34, to receive the rifle and **Roger Hamann**, Rustic Yankee 72, a GIB, to be the back-up recipient. The rifle has been delivered to Mike who lives in TN. Mike is in the process of sending a substantial donation to the Rustic's Cambodian Charity Fund.

WHAT THE RUSTIC FAMILY, OR BEING A RUSTIC, HAS MEANT TO ME. Prior to our 2017 reunion we asked everyone to submit comments on what being a Rustic has meant to them, or what it has meant to be part of the Rustic family. Below are some of the responses. Future newsletters will contain others.

From Don Ellis, (Rustic 17, Nov 70-Jun 71). It has always amazed me that some of you have such a detailed memory of life in Viet Nam. I don't know what plane I flew on what day or how many hours I logged on which plane, or how many missions I flew while I was there.

I didn't even remember how I got into the Rustics until about 3 years ago when I read the letters that I sent to my wife while I was in Vietnam. My entry into the Rustics depended on a coin toss which I lost. For some reason, and I don't remember what it was, I did not relish the idea of being a Rustic.

Until I was. The camaraderie and mission made the difference.

Our mission was to help the Cambodians survive and they were an integral part of that. I did not feel that the Vietnamese were as invested in the fight against Communism as we were. So, it was uplifting to be part of a cause.

The camaraderie was something else. I had only been a member of military fraternities in college. What I shared with other Rustics is what I thought that social fraternity brothers shared.

And today we still share that camaraderie. Not only that but our reunions have also given me a chance to release some of the feelings I had not shared since returning from Vietnam. My wife says that she heard some new stories about my experience since we started having the reunions.

So, thank you, my brothers, for the Rustic experience.

From Mike Gagne, Rustic K (Jul-Dec 70). I always knew that sooner or later my French skills would get me into trouble! I didn't realize when I said "Yes, I volunteer" that I would be strapped in a twin prop roller coaster! Just joking! Actually, at Tan Son Nhut, working on the flight line shoving ammo, frozen steaks and body bags, I did feel, not useless, but that there would be some opportunity to use my French during my tour. I did use it a lot when I went downtown Saigon, French speaking Vietnamese and also an old French couple who had stayed over from the last war. I also used to eat at a French restaurant where the Air France crews ate. It was cool being able to have some news from my adoptive country.

Anyway, here I go plunged into uncertainty only to find a great bunch of guys at Bien Hoa. As an "enlisted" I was quite surprised how well everyone got along, officers, airmen, NCO's. I was always confident with my pilots when strapping in the OV but I must admit the first flight with Lou Currier was HELL!

Anyway, it's been one of the greatest experiences of my lifetime, being able to help our fellow Cambodians was an honor and not once did I regret joining this great group of courageous men the RUSTICS, those still with us and those who have left us...too soon.

From Roger Hamann, Rustic Y (Nov 71-Aug 72). My wife once told me that I judge myself based on what I did during my time serving in the Air Force--in particular--my tour as a Rustic. She MAY be correct.

When I enlisted in June of 1970, flying with the greatest bunch of young (and middle aged) pilots the Air Force had to offer was not something I ever dreamt I would be doing. My first assignment out of Lackland had me refueling buffs and tankers at Wurtsmith AFB. After a year of living at that remote SAC base in Michigan and having spoken with returning POL troops from Vietnam and Thailand, I decided to put in a volunteer statement for Southeast Asia.

Little did I know that the spur of the moment decision to take the language test at Lackland during basic training would prove to be the key to my chance to fly in the Air Force, a privilege most airmen never have the opportunity to do.

Given the chance to become an interpreter, flying in the back seat of an OV-10, was an option I agreed to without a second thought. It would be the challenge of my young life but it sure beat driving a truck with 5000 gallons of jet fuel!

I celebrated my 21st birthday at Phan Rang AB in South Vietnam shortly after my arrival there in October 1971. After a meeting with **Capt. Murphy**, I was chosen as one of the interpreters who would be continuing on with the Rustics who were in the process of relocating to Ubon RTAFB. On November 11, 1971, Major **Ben Atkins** took a shy and naive, two-striper on his first OV-10 ride to Thailand. It was there that I met my fellow interpreters, two of whom were also from Maine.

The next ten months would become a real eye opener. Although most of the 169 missions I flew are now vague glimpses into the past, certain missions will forever be imbedded in this old GIB's memory bank. My first mission with **Tom Clinch**, the Christmas time mission with **Wayne Wood**, the many missions I flew with Mac Le FAC, **Jerry McClellan**, who was also my fini flight driver. The racquetball games with **Doug Aitken**, the spaghetti suppers put on by **Marcel Morneau**, the card games in the GIB hooch with **Joe Garand**, **Ralph Dow**, **Doug Norman**, **Nick Lewis** and **Jean Claude Gestas**. The fini parties at the Rustic hooch, **Ting**, the bar maid, the visit by **Col. Oum** and **Sam**...all great memories, because of great warriors who believed in what they were doing, the mission they were tasked to perform, the comradery that kept us mission oriented. I have never again experienced anything like that time I spent as a Rustic.

I am damn proud of my Rustic tour, the highlight of my three years and eight months in the Air Force. So, yes, my wife IS right! I love my wife, yes I do, yes I do! I love her truly.

From Bob Harris, Rustic 33 (Nov 70-Sep 71). Being a Rustic has been a very positive influence throughout my civilian life. In fact, it certainly helped my career with the Department of Homeland Security. And recently I have been invited to be the keynote speaker at the MOAA sponsored Veterans Day celebration to be held in front of the Veterans' Center, Ardmore, OK on Nov 10th. All together I'll be speaking to 2,500 people. You know our Rustic story will play a major part in my remarks.

Being a Rustic represents Duty, Honor and Country to me and all that our Stars and Stripes symbolizes.

Now retired in southern Oklahoma and doing all I can to support the current conservative administration. Cheryl and I can't make the reunion but our thoughts will be with you all. Also, we certainly enjoyed our visit with the Rustic A-10 drivers at Moody AFB this last Spring.

From Jon Safley, Rustic 19 (Mar 72-Dec 72). Being a Rustic means more and more to me every year. As I look back, it's hard to believe that the Air Force leaders would give a bunch of young airmen the responsibilities we were given as Rustics. But they did, and we showed them "how to do it right."

What does being a Rustic mean to me? First, life-long friends. Second, being a proud alum of one of, if not, the best FAC units in SEA. In the grander scheme of things, being a Rustic "turbocharged" my flying and decision-making skills which helped me during the rest of my Air Force career. 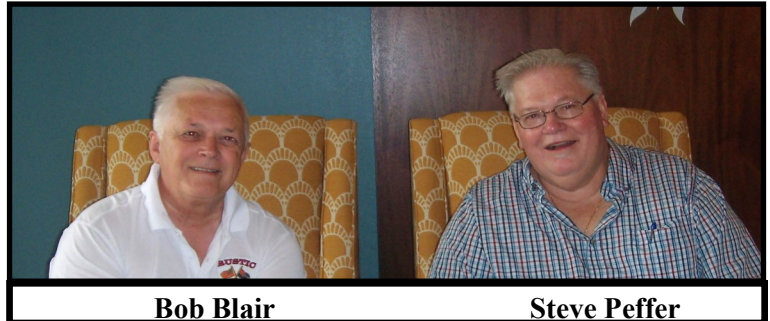
