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CAMBODIAN CHARITIES. The Rustics continue to support Cambodian charities in Kompong Cham. At the recommendation of our contacts at Sunrise Ministries in Kompong Cham, your association recently sent \$1,370 to Sunrise Ministries. They, in turn, will see that the money is used by the Kompong Cham children's orphanage to provide specialized tutoring for nine students for one year. This is extra schooling to help the senior students prepare for their final graduation exams. This is tutoring which is needed, but which otherwise would not be available to the students. RUSTICS MAKE A DONATION TO THE HURLBURT AIR PARK. Doug Aitken. The Board of Directors recently approved a \$1,000 donation to the Hurlburt Air Park specifically earmarked for maintenance of OV-10 tail number 626, and included an accompanying request that the Air Park committee attempt to find some rocket pods and a centerline tank so the aircraft will more reflect the configuration we flew. (As you may know, the O-2 on display does have rocket pods under her wings.) In response, we received a nice thank you letter from Colonel Sean M. Farrell, Commander, 1st Special Operations Wing, Hurlburt Field, FL.

HISTORIAN REPORT. Jon Safley. The project to return Rustic book source materials (documents/tapes/CDs) to their "rightful owners" is moving along smoothly. These were items that were formerly maintained in our Rustic History archives by our first historian, **Jim Gabel**. They were initially collected to help us write our Rustic history. Now that our book is completed, we want to return these items to their owners. Of the 27 total "rightful owners" I attempted to contact all via either email, snail mail, or phone call.

Their disposition options are: (1) return to "rightful owner," (2) destroy, or (3) forward to the Ft Worth Aviation Museum (FWAM) where a portion of our Rustic artifacts are all ready archived.

Fourteen have responded to me so far and their source materials have been disposed of according to their instructions. The majority of the 14 want their source materials sent to the FWAM. I will follow up with the remaining "rightful owners" who have yet to respond.

For those "rightful owners" I can't contact within a year from the start date of this project (Feb 2016), I will include their source material in the package I send to FWAM.

8mm Film: I have yet to investigate transferring the 8mm film in our archives to a useable format but it's etched onto my "To Do" list.

DON MERCER CONTINUES HIS PHOTO QUEST OF OUR NATIONAL PARKS. Don Mercer. Having just returned late Friday night (May 20) from a 24-day road trip covering 6,229 miles, I am now going to

attempt to reenter society... well, at least social media via Facebook. I departed on the trip on April 27 with three objectives in mind:

- 1) To meet up with three friends in McAllen, Texas, to shoot birds from blinds at a south Texas ranch, Campos Viejos, for four days;
- 2) To visit four fellow Air Force pilots from bygone days, two of whom I flew with in Southeast Asia - **Bob ''Redeye'' Harris** and **Mike Thrower**, along the way in Oklahoma, two in Texas, and one in Tennessee; and
- 3) To visit and photograph in each of four more National Parks (NP): Hot Springs in Arkansas; Big Bend and Guadalupe Mountains in Texas; and Carlsbad Caverns in New Mexico.

Fortunately, I accomplished all with only a couple tests of my flexibility, no accidents, and having experienced no close calls with wildlife. I came by an extra day, as a I made the trip from

Campos Viejos on May 9 to Terlingua, Texas, on the west side of Big Bend, in one day as opposed to two. Then, on arriving at Guadalupe Mountains NP, a forest fire initiated by lightning had grown to over 10,000 acres within the Park, resulting in three of the four entrances having been closed. As a result, I reduced my planned 3-day shoot there by two days.

Thanks to the saved days, I added an overnight in Alamogordo, New Mexico, in order to shoot one day in White Sands National Monument. I also added one day to my trek back across the country to ease the overall return road trip, and I arrived home one day earlier than planned.

This brings to thirty-seven National Parks that I have visited and photographed since beginning my personal project in October 2013. With twenty-two remaining, my current target date for completion is the spring of 2019.



OV-10s USED TO KILL ISIS FIGHTERS WITH SNIPER-LIKE ACCURACY. Here's an article sent in by **David Parsons**, Rustic 08, from The Fiscal Times, by Martin Matishak, May 19, 2016.

plane in 1970. Even decades-old warplanes can have an interesting second act, provided they get the right up-


grade.



"The small, twin-engine Bronco was used for reconnaissance and light air support in Vietnam, but it wasn't designed for the heavy-duty combat missions that the A-10 Thunderbolt II attack jet has handled in Iraq and Afghanistan.

"Some speculated that the deployment was intended to help department leaders get a better grasp on the kind of warplane


that should replace the A-10, affectionately called the "Warthog," which the Air Force has targeted for retirement.



Like other laser-guided rockets such as the Hellfire, the BAE-manufactured APKWS can be fired from close range or from miles away and can destroy enemy personnel and even lightly armored vehicles, minus the collateral damage that occurs with less-precise ordnance.

The Pentagon was apparently impressed with the Bronco's performance, which The War Zone characterized as "almost freakish." The planes enabled crews to find enemy troops, even those hiding in doorways and in dense brush, and kill them with sniper-like accuracy.

David Parson's reaction to this article, "Yes, that is me! 25 years old. I was the first US military personnel to go into Cambodia after they switched sides from the Chinese to the USA. I met with the Cambodian Minister of Defense to plan an offensive strategy against the North Vietnamese. Quite an experience for a young kid! This



was my 2nd or 3rd Rustic mission. Claude, thanks for all you do for the Rustics and all us old guys! **David Parsons**

"LOST OVER LAOS" (Here is a new story just submitted by Bill Ernst, Rustic 04).

Baron 52 was an EC-47 operating out of Ubon RTAFB. They were equipped with secret surveillance equipment used to help identify enemy tank movements down the Ho Chi Minh Trail. They were flying a night mission over Laos on 4 Feb 1973 when their aircraft was shot down.

Onboard was a flight crew of four from the 361st Tactical Electronic Warfare Squadron and four electronic warfare specialists from the 6994 Security Squadron. Controversy still remains as to whether there were any survivors. The complete story, and the controversy over whether any crewmembers may have survived the crash and been captured, is chronicled in the April 15, 2016 issue of "Stars and Stripes."



The EC-47 was shot down over Laos and no crewmembers were recovered alive. One of the men on board was later identified from partial remains found at the site. He had been declared dead in a letter that was sent to his family in February 1973. The family wants his status changed to Missing in Action.

The loss of this USAF aircrew and plane will always be in my mind. While I was assigned as the commander of the 23 TASS unit at Ubon RTAFB, Thailand, flying OV-10 aircraft, we shared our operations building on the flight line with the 361st Tactical Electronic Warfare Squadron, which flew the EC-47 aircraft.

When the EC-47 did not return from the night flight, rescue procedures were begun at the local headquarters. It was determined that our OV-10 aircraft were the ideal method to begin the aerial search, so pilots were assigned search areas. I took off that next morning, before dawn, to search a segment of Laos. Several hours into the mission I saw what appeared to be an airplane on the ground. A closer look confirmed that I had found the missing airplane. I began an immediate climb to the maximum height that I could obtain and called our tactical headquarters on my UHF radio. After contact was made I switched to the Secure Communications Mode and gave my report of the site and surrounding terrain features. I remained there for a long period answering questions and then returned to Ubon RTAFB, where I gave another report by secure telephone to the headquarters.

The next morning, I was not on the flying schedule so I added myself to fly with one of our pilots. We took off and proceeded to the crash site. At the appointed time just before dawn we saw two rescue helicopters and their fighter escort approaching the site at very low altitude. One helicopter went to the crash site and hovered. We could see the PJ as he lowered himself the last few feet to the airplane.



Small arms ground fire began and he was forced to climb back to the helicopter. A short time later the rescue attempt was terminated.

I am proud of the fact that I was involved with the rescue attempt but sorry that the rescue was not successful. *Bill Ernst, Rustic 04*


cluded with full military honors including presentation of the American flag to Susan by an Air Force Honor Guard, the playing of taps, and a final gun salute.

O-2A TAIL MARKING QUESTION from the FACNET July 7, 2016, "recine123@gmail.com [FACNET].

I am curious if any O-2's had any special marking on the tail fins besides the tail # and "USAF", i.e. logos, unit markings, etc.? I'm restoring the right hand tail boom and fin from aircraft 68-10868. Unfortunately, it's the only major component left of this aircraft aside from a flap and nose gear doors. The rest was cut up and scrapped by an aviation school near Boston a couple of years ago, and that's all I was able to salvage.

I don't have the history of this aircraft, aside from it last being with the 549th Tactical Air Support Training Squadron at Patrick AFB until 1986 when it went to civil registry prior to being given to the aviation school.

It would be nice to see period pics of some aircraft in service in Vietnam c. 1967-1971 to get some idea of markings.

Can any of you help with photos or information on tail # 68-10868? <u>Was it a Rustic bird</u>? Red Marker FAC Gary Willis reports that Joe Baugher's website (joebaugher.com) has tail numbers for virtually all military aircraft from WW11 on. His site shows 68-10868 as going to civil registry as N4101P on May 25, 1991.

THE 19 WEAPONS SQUADRON IS THE SUCCESSOR TO THE 19th TASS. At different times this past year Shad Kimball and Doug Aitken (and his Grove City College fraternity reunion group) were hosted by the 19 WS at Nellis AFB. The 19 WPS is now the successor to the 19th TASS, and, as you recall, the Rustics belonged to the 19 TASS at Bien Hoa AB, Vietnam.

The 19th WPS is a non-flying unit, assigned to the **USAF Weapons School** at **Nellis** AFB, Nevada.

The squadron was first activated as the 19th Observation Squadron in March 1942. The 19th originally flew antisubmarine missions during World War II, then moved to China in 1944 to begin observation missions in support of Chinese ground forces. It later flew resupply missions to resistance forces operating behind enemy lines in French Indochina.

The squadron was redesignated the 19th Tactical Air Support Squadron, then organized in July 1963. From 1963 through 1968 the 19th Tactical Air Support Squadron flew forward air support and observation missions over Vietnam. The Rustics were under its banner, as well as the Sundog and Tilly FACs from June 1970 to October 1971. That year, its mission was transferred to Osan AB, South Korea in 1972, where it provided Eighth US Army and Republic of Korea ground forces with aerial reconnaissance and close air support.

The host for **Doug Aitken's** group visit was Captain **Bill "Torn" Tompkins.** Next Fall Torn will be attending school at Maxwell AFB when the Rustics hold their 20th Anniversary reunion in Ft Walton Beach, FL. and Torn said he plans to join us for the weekend.



At their request, the Rustic Board has approved the 19 WS to become an addressee to all future Rustic newsletters.

The 19 WEAPONS SQUADRON BAR NAMED IN HONOR OF RUSTIC JERRY AUTH. Captain Bill "Torn" Tompkins, Rustic O, reports, "We recently named our squadron bar 'Jerry's' in honor of Capt Jerry Auth who flew the first Rustic mission. I know that he has passed away, but do you by any chance have contact information for his family? We are interested in getting a picture to hang honoring him. In addition to the picture we want to frame an excerpt from "Call Sign Rustic" describing the first mission. We are in the process of getting the walls and floor remodeled, I will send you pictures once it is complete."

Doug Aitken has been coordinating with the 19 WS and Jerry's next-of-kin regarding this request. Upon hearing the news, Gloria Auth, Jerry's wife, replied:

"Well Jerry has an AWAC training center named after him, a tree in the park, a Silver Star posthumously, and I am finally taking him back to Pittsburgh to the military Cemetery of the Alleghenies. We were both born and raised in Pittsburgh and I've just been waiting for the right time. Guess 23 years later is enough time, and a bar to boot!"

RUSTIC DAVE PARSONS COORDINATES 2017 MEDICAL MISSIONS TO HONDURAS. David

Parsons, Rustic 08, is heading up two medical teams to Honduras in 2017 which will share the Good News while using caring medical, surgical and dental care as their platform. They will be in Honduras 22 Aug -4 Sep 2017. The medical teams will have a village component each day so the non-surgical part of the team can offer medical care in rural villages within about an hour drive from the hospital. In 2016 they went to villages in the mountains around 3600' elevation. (Mosquitoes don't like altitudes above 2000'). Guaimaca, where their mission work and hospital are located, is 2600'. Nice!

Dave reports, "We will bring General Surgery, Orthopedics, Ob-Gyn, ENT and Oral Surgery. We need many Anesthesiologists and CRNA's and tons of nurses and surgtechs. We also need dentists and medical doctors. Please help us recruit. But we also need support personnel just like you! Let me know if you are interested. Adios, from Honduras." STATISTICS FROM THE VIETNAM WAR, posted on FACNET by **AL Matheson**/Nail 213, FAC Association Historian:

"Of the 2,709,918 Americans who served in Vietnam, Less than 850,000 are estimated to be alive today, with the youngest American Vietnam veteran's age approximated to be 60 years old." If you're alive and reading this you are among 1/3rd of all the U.S. Vets who served in Vietnam. Only a few of us will survive by 2025. 390 VN vets die a day. So in only 6-10 years... 2190 days... from today, you will be lucky to be alive. (These statistics were taken from a variety of sources to include: The VFW Magazine, the Public Information Office, and the HQ CP Forward Observer - 1st Recon)

STATISTICS FOR INDIVIDUALS IN UNIFORM AND IN COUNTRY VIETNAM VETER-

ANS: 9,087,000 military personnel served on active duty during the Vietnam Era (August 5, 1964 - May 7, 1975). 8,744,000 GIs were on active duty during the war (Aug 5, 1964-March 28, 1973). 2,709,918 Americans served in Vietnam, this number represents 9.7% of their generation. 3,403,100 (Including 514,300 offshore) personnel served in the broader Southeast Asia Theater (Vietnam, Laos, Cambodia, flight crews based in Thailand, and sailors in adjacent South China Sea waters). 2,594,000 personnel served within the borders of South Vietnam (Jan. 1, 1965 - March 28, 1973). Another 50,000 men served in Vietnam between 1960 and 1964. Of the 2.6 million, between 1-1.6 million (40-60%) either fought in combat, provided close support or were at least fairly regularly exposed to enemy attack.

7,484 women (6,250 or 83.5% were nurses) served in Vietnam. Peak troop strength in Vietnam: 543,482 (April 30, 1968).

AGENT ORANGE. Agent Orange is taking a huge toll on Vietnam Veterans with most deaths somehow related to Agent Orange exposure. No one dies of Agent Orange. They die from the exposure which purportedly causes ischemic Heart Disease and failure, Lung Cancer, Kidney failure or COPD related disorders.

CASUALTIES: The first man to die in Vietnam was James Davis, in 1958. He was with the 509th Radio Research Station. Davis Station in Saigon was named for him.

Hostile deaths: 47,378

Non-hostile deaths: 10,800 Total: 58,202 (Includes men formerly classified as MIA and Mayaguez casualties). Men who have subsequently died of wounds account for the changing total. 8 nurses died -- 1 was KIA. 61% of the men killed were 21 or younger. 11,465 of those killed were younger than 20 years old. Of those killed, 17,539 were married.

Average age of men killed: 23.1 years Total Deaths: 23.11 years. Enlisted: 50,274; 22.37 years. Officers: 6,598; 28.43 years. Warrants: 1,276; 24.73 years. E1: 525; 20.34 years.

Five men killed in Vietnam were only 16 years old. The oldest man killed was 62 years old. Highest state death rate: West Virginia - 84.1% (national average 58.9% for every 100,000 males in 1970). Wounded: 303,704 -- 153,329 hospitalized + 150,375 injured requiring no hospital care. Severely disabled: 75,000, -- 23,214: 100% disabled; 283 lost limbs; 1,081 sustained multiple amputations. Amputation or crippling wounds to the lower extremities were 300% higher than in WWII and 70% higher than Korea. Multiple amputations occurred at the rate of 18.4% compared to 5.7% in WWII. Missing in Action: 2,338 POWs: 766 (114 died in captivity) As of January 15, 2014, there are 1,875 Americans still unaccounted for, from the Vietnam War.

DRAFTEES VS. VOLUNTEERS: 25% (648,500) of total forces in country were draftees. (66% of U.S. armed forces members were drafted during WWII). Draftees accounted for 30.4% (17,725) of combat deaths in Vietnam. Reservists killed: 5,977 National Guard: 6,140 served: 101 died. Total draftees (1965 - 73): 1,728,344. Actually served in Vietnam: 38% Marine Corps Draft: 42,633. Last man drafted: June 30, 1973.

RACE AND ETHNIC BACKGROUND: 88.4% of the men who actually served in Vietnam were Caucasian; 10.6% (275,000) were black; 1% belonged to other races. 86.3% of the men who died in Vietnam were Caucasian (includes Hispanics); 12.5% (7,241) were black; 1.2% belonged to other races. 170,000 Hispanics served in Vietnam; 3,070 (5.2% of total) died there. 70% of enlisted men killed were of North-west European descent. 86.8% of the men who were killed as a result of hostile action were Caucasian; 12.1% (5,711) were black; 1.1% belonged to other races. 14.6% (1,530) of non-combat deaths were among blacks. 34% of blacks who enlisted volunteered for the combat arms. Overall, blacks suffered only12.5% of the deaths in Vietnam, at a time when the percentage of blacks of military age was 13.5% of the total population.

Religion of Dead: Protestant -- 64.4%; Catholic -- 28.9%; other/none -- 6.7%

SOCIO-ECONOMIC STATUS. Vietnam veterans have a lower unemployment rate than the same nonvet age groups. Vietnam veterans' personal income exceeds that of our non-veteranage group by more than 18 percent. 76% of the men sent to Vietnam were from lower middle/working class backgrounds. Three-fourths had family incomes above the poverty level; 50% were from middle income backgrounds. Some 23% of Vietnam vets had fathers with professional, managerial or technical occupations. 79% of the men who served in Vietnam had a high school education or better when they entered the military service. 63% of Korean War vets and only 45% of WWII vets had completed high school upon separation. Deaths by region per 100,000 of population: South -- 31%, West--29.9%; Midwest -- 28.4%; Northeast -- 23.5%. **DRUG USAGE & CRIME**. There is no difference in drug usage between Vietnam Veterans and non-

Vietnam Veterans of the same age group. (Source: Veterans Administration Study) Vietnam Veterans are less likely to be in prison - only one-half of one percent of Vietnam Veterans have been jailed for crimes. 85% of Vietnam Veterans made successful transitions to civilian life.

WINNING & LOSING. 82% of veterans who saw heavy combat strongly believe the war was lost because of lack of political will. Nearly 75% of the public agrees it was a failure of political will, not of arms.

HONORABLE SERVICE. 97% of Vietnam-era veterans were honorably discharged. 91% of actual Vietnam War veterans and 90% of those who saw heavy combat are proud to have served their country. 74% say they would serve again, even knowing the outcome. 87% of the populace now say they hold Vietnam Veterans in high esteem.
